#### A letter from your Holy Family priest |"Our hope, our real hope, of eternal life is baptism in which we are inserted into"

Since the First Week of Ordinary Time we have been slowly going through the ending chapters of Saint Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians. Our meditation has been nudged towards thoughts on the resurrection of the body. It is one thing to hope in the resurrection and another thing to ground that hope in something. Saint Paul helps us to do just that.

In last week's Mass, Saint Paul removed any possibility of relegating the resurrection of the dead to the realm of "comforting truths" which do not conform to reality. We heard bluntly, *if the dead are not raised, neither has Christ been raised, and if Christ has not been raised, your faith is vain; you are still in your sins*. Saint Paul knew what he was talking about and he staked his life on the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Saint Paul went from the greatest persecutor of the Church (c.f. Acts 9:1) to its greatest evangelist (c.f. Gal 2:9). The hinge upon which the direction of Saint Paul's life swiveled, from persecutor to proclaimer, was nothing other than an encounter with the Risen Christ (Acts 9:3-7).

This week, in our second reading, Saint Paul carves out in startling relief the juxtaposition between the earthly and the heavenly and he ends with the conviction that we will share in both. Saint Paul places side by side the first and the last Adam, i.e. humanity and Jesus Christ, and draws out the difference. One comes from the earth, the other from heaven. One is "natural" in the sense of belonging to this world, the other is "spiritual," stemming from God's own life. Yet Saint Paul is insistent, *just as we have born the image of the earthly one, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly one*. The earthly one is the life of Adam, the life of the Fall, the life of sin. The heavenly one is life in Christ, life after death, eternal life. With two sharply distinct entities, as opposite as death and life, how could the two possibly come together?

The two find their meeting point in baptism. Just consider part of the blessing given over the water before a catechumen is baptized. *May this water receive by the Holy Spirit the grace of your Only Begotten Son, so that human nature, created in your image and washed clean through the Sacrament of Baptism from all the squalor of the life of old, may be found worthy to rise to the life of newborn children through water and the Holy Spirit.* 

Our hope, our real hope, of eternal life is baptism in which we are inserted into, made members of, the Body of Christ. As Saint Augustine eloquently put it, "where the Head goes, the body follows," and as real as the resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ is, so also our hope that we too will rise.
