Etymologically the word superstition comes from the Latin: *superstitio -onis*. That is to say that the superstition in a belief contrary to our faith and doctrine taught by the Holy Mother Church (The Catholic Church). The Catechism of the Catholic Church (2111) says that superstition is the deviation of religious sentiment and the practices it imposes. Superstition is a serious sin, which affects the worship of the One and true God. At the same time, it has been seen that many Catholics come to commit sacrilege against the most sacred: for example, attributing themselves to offices that correspond only to the priest, using sacred oils (which can only be used by the priest for the sacraments). Consequently, “sacrilege, as far as it is concerned, violates a sacred thing or person, even though the thing is not actually violated. Saint Thomas Aquinas explains these in the *Summa Theologica* (1–2 q.101 a.4).

It is also superstition when an importance, somehow magical, is attributed to certain practices, otherwise legitimate or necessary. To attribute its effectiveness to the mere materiality of prayers or sacramental signs, regardless of the internal provisions they require, is to fall into superstition (Matthew 23, 16–22). That is why Saint Thomas Aquinas explains in the *Summa Teologica* (1–2 q.101 a.4) “*that as is clear from what has already been explained, the cause for which things are called sacred is because they are destined for divine worship. And just as by the ordering of anything to a good end it participates in its goodness, in a similar way, by the fact that a thing is destined for the worship of God, something divine is made of it, and one owes it, for this reason. motive, a certain reverence, which ultimately refers to God. Therefore, everything that implies irreverence to sacred things is an injury to God, and constitutes a sacrilege.*”

On the other hand, it is very common to fall into superstition in the use of sacramentals and prayers, trusting only in the materiality of the act without having an adequate interior disposition and not placing our trust in God. There are many people who give more importance to the use of a religious object, than to the one who gives it that power, which is God himself. It is superstitious, for example, who wears a scapular, but does not keep in his heart fidelity to the Blessed Virgin, but gives himself up to sin thinking that just by wearing it he will be saved. At the same time, it is important to point out that tradition should not be confused with superstition. Traditions would be superstitious only if magical powers are attributed to them, or beliefs contrary to Catholic doctrine and faith. For example, believing that the dead come to eat and drink on specific dates is superstitious, and it is contrary to Catholic doctrine and faith, since Holy Mother Church teaches that the deceased can only go to heaven, hell or purgatory. Therefore, in superstition and sacrilege we find a special reason for deformity, because with it a sacred thing is violated by not treating it with due respect. Therefore, it is a special sin. Let us know our true faith so that we do not fall into these sins.
